A good photograph should not simply record what we saw but convey our unique perspective and impression. The discussion covers the stages of maturity in our ability to pre-visualize and key considerations for creative photography.

In this presentation you will learn how to leverage the power of your iPhone to work in this fun and creative space. Using the Slow Shutter and Average Camera Pro apps to unleash your inner photo expressionist, see differently, push the boundaries of traditional photography and increase your personal creativity quotient—all using your iPhone.

Bio

Based in Stamford, Connecticut, Deborah Loeb Bohren is a travel-inspired fine art and editorial photographer, focusing on the creation of intimate and grand portraits of natural and man-made environments around the globe. She uses her camera as an artist would use a paintbrush. Think of her work as visual alchemy: a transformation not of matter into gold but rather of light, color, line and gesture into images. Techniques such as intentional camera movement (ICM), in-camera multiple exposure, minimalism and abstraction are the primary tools of her alchemy. These techniques work to allow her to challenge reality and capture a feeling, emotion or impression rather than simply recording what lies in front of the lens. Her images are part of individual, private and corporate collections around the country and have been in gallery and museum exhibitions. She serves as a judge and guest presenter at camera clubs around the country and teaches a range of photography courses and travel Photography workshops. She is also a regular contributor to Everett Potter's Travel Report, sharing her global travels through words and images.

Weir Farm National Historical Park

Weir Farm National Historical Park is one of those special places that is worth a visit. This historical park is located in Wilton, CT. It was the home of the American impressionist painter J. Alden Weir and also displays paintings from other artists who stayed as guests. The property consists of 60 acres of painterly woods, fields, a pond, and numerous trails through the woods and multiple buildings. We were fortunate to go on a day when the park service was providing tours of the main residence and Weir's studio. Nineteenth-century red clapper siding building with stonewalls, plantings and colorful trees all around. This is a special place where many artists have come to engage in plein air painting. The official park map shows many of the paintings and identifies the locations where the paintings were done. You can apply for a month-long artist in residence. We spoke with a woman, from Chicago, who was spending her time creating unique woodcuts.

Established in 1960 this visionary park is truly unique. There are sculptures made of metal, stone, wood, plastic and combinations of all of the above. Some works are relatively small and others are massive in size and scope. Sculptures are spread throughout the park, so you spend a good portion of your time walking around appreciating the natural beauty of the setting. The fall is the most popular time to visit, as crimson foliage both in the park and on full display in the hills surrounding the official space is a feast for the eyes. The display of the various works changes with how the light strikes the piece as the day progresses. So, you can walk around and around and come back for many return visits.

Bronx Zoo



Member in Focus: Arik Gorban

[iD] When and how did you first get involved in photography?

[AG] I started with photography over 50 years ago. A neighbor had a darkroom and got me hooked. When I was still in elementary school, my parents got me a camera, a few lenses, a darkroom, and a few books on photography.

[iD] What is your profession?

[AG] My background is in computer sciences. For the last 25 years of my career, I was an IT-compliance consultant to pharmaceutical, biotech, and medical device companies and their vendors. I'm retired from the consulting job now. I've also done some commercial (buildings and products), event, portrait, maternity, and newborn photography, and various photography workshops.

- [iD] How long have you been a member of WPS?
- [AG] I joined in September 2024.
- [iD] What type of photography do you enjoy?
- [AG] Street and people photography are my favorites, but I enjoy other types of photography as well. Since I became an FAA-certified drone pilot I've been very busy with aerial photography. Sometimes, I go beyond the straight photograph and create images from my mind's eye, as you can see in a couple of my pictures in the exhibit, but all the work is done in Photoshop.

[iD] Do you do photo projects, and if so please describe a recent or favorite one.

[AG] My photography is often driven by personal projects. A project might be a single outing, an ongoing project that lasts weeks or months, or a photography trip. I usually have a specific objective in mind; for example, my long road trips to experience and document life in various regions of the country, a day-trip to photograph people in a nearby town or New York, or creating floral abstracts with flowers that I purchased. Some of my projects are creating artwork in Photoshop using various pictures and textures that I photographed in the past. A project that took a month to plan, three months to photograph, and another month to compile into a book was "Empty Street at Night." I went to 20 towns between 11 PM and 3 AM and photographed the empty streets. It was about mood, light and shadows, and storytelling.

[iD] What inspires you?

- [AG] Listening to and looking at artwork of creative artists, not just photographers.
- [iD] What do you hope to get out of your membership in WPS?
- [AG] Photography is my passion. I do something related to photography every day. I get inspired by watching other photographers present or talk about this form of art.

[iD] Do you have any favorite photographers?

[AG] Well, the list is long, but as Brooks Jensen, the publisher of LensWork Magazine, a teacher, and an artist, says, there are two types of people that enrich your creative work: Heroes and Fellow Travelers. The heroes are the ones that inspire you, but not necessarily teach you, mainly because they do different things. My heroes include Ansel Adams, Edward Weston, Galen Rowell, Garry Winogrand, and William Eggleston. Fellow Travelers are the ones that you learn from. Their work and teaching help you improve your artwork. Brooks Jensen, Joe McNally, Lindsey Adler, Ruddy Roye, and Brooke Shaden are a few of the photographers that directly affect my work.



[iD] What gear and tools do you use? (Cameras/lenses, photoshop, etc.)

[AG] My main gear is a Nikon system that includes a few DSLRs and mirrorless cameras. Two cameras are converted to infrared. I also use a small Sony point and shoot, my Samsung phone, and a drone. I'm an advanced Adobe Photoshop / ACR / Bridge user. My main plugins are Topaz AI tools, NIK suite, PortraitPro, and PortraitPro Body.

[iD] Tell me something about you unrelated to photography.

[AG] My companion for most of my trips and photography outings is my rescue dog. She's almost always next to me. Our road trips already took her to 27 states. My wife also joins sometimes.

[iD] What's one piece of advice you would give our readers (photographic or otherwise)?

[AG] Expose yourself to a wider range of the photography than what you see in the camera club. Visit museums and galleries (even online) and study work that is different from the pictures that score high in club competitions. In my presentations, I try to break some of the rigid and narrowly-defined set of aesthetic rules that many club members and competition judges adhere to and expose the members to various types of fine-art photography. Most camera club photographers are trained to focus on the technical aspects of their images and the rules of composition. They rarely focus on artwork that expresses their feelings and creates an emotional impact.
